The TLCA 2009 Conference 'Landcare in a Changing Climate'

The 2009 Tasmanian Landcare Association Conference – Landcare in a Changing Climate, was held in Swansea on 8 and 9 November. Well attended, the program included two field trips (north and south of Swansea) on Sunday 8 November, and the main conference program on Monday 9 November. The State Landcare Awards were held on the Sunday night (*see article Page 1*).

Our thanks to Leanne Sherriff and Mel Kelly for co-ordinating the southern field trip, and Dean Vincent for his work on the northern excursion. The two field trips highlighted various innovative practices in salinity and soil carbon management, aquaculture, walnut production, fish care and conservation on private land.

The conference the following day featured Professor Ian Lowe as the much enjoyed key note speaker, with terrific plenary presentations from Brendan McMahon, Bureau of Meteorology and Biz Nicolson, Bonneys Plains. Concurrent sessions were held during the afternoon at various venues around Swansea under four themes – Landcare, who's caring and how; Opportunities and innovations; Walk and talk and Landcare futures. Examples of local adaptation, community commitment, persistence and passion were shared by participants.

The conference provided a great opportunity to hear new ideas and perspectives, and to meet fellow landcarers. And so much of community landcare is about people, connections, and relationships! Opening speaker, John Whittington (DPIPWE) acknowledged the great role of community landcare in the state. He reminded participants that the movement should maintain its shape and an orientation to its beginnings during these challenging times.

The conference brought landcarers together to consider climate change and the role of community. It is clear that in a changing climate community landcare holds great importance, offering to nourish our land, our lifestyles and our livelihoods.

The TLCA would like to thank the Conference and Awards Organising Committee, Dean Vincent and Lyndley Chopping and particularly Leanne Sherriff and Lola Cowle. Australian Landcare Council re-established

The Rudd Government has re-established the Australian Landcare Council to strengthen relationships between the Australian Government and the Landcare movement. The Council aspires to work with community, farmers, Indigenous land managers and urban groups to facilitate sustainable natural resource management solutions.

The Council will provide advice to the Minister for Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries Tony Burke and the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and the Arts, Peter Garrett on Landcare's contribution to a range of national issues such as climate change, drought, and productivity now and into the future.

Former Western Australia Agriculture Minister Kim Chance has been appointed as Chair of the Council. Other members are yet to be announced.

New National Landcare Facilitator Appointed

Brett de Hayr has been appointed the new National Landcare facilitator. Brett said he was looking forward to a fresh start with Landcare, working closely with the national community of Landcare facilitators across Australia. The role aims to connect Landcare groups across Australia with the Government.

Mr de Hayr has held executive positions with the Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association, the Cattle Council of Australia and AgForce, and

was most recently the former Executive Director of Sustainable Agriculture for Queensland Primary Industries and Fisheries.

Coral Love steps down from this role after nearly eight years in the position. Coral will continue to provide advice to the Australian Government on Landcare matters .

Tasmanian weed alert network – seeking volunteers

The Tasmanian Weed Alert Network was launched in October by the Tasmanian Conservation Trust in partnership with Department of Primary Industries, Parks, Water and Environment, Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association, Tasmanian Herbarium and the Tasmanian Weed Society. This important project will strengthen Tasmania's ability to detect and intervene early against new weed incursions. It is funded by the Tasmanian Community Fund.

The Network is a growing group of volunteers who are on the lookout for new weeds in Tasmania. They have some skills in identifying plants, and their work (or play) gets them outdoors most of the day.

Project officer Jonah Gouldthorpe and the Network's steering committee are finalising a list of weeds to target. They include a mix of declared (or noxious) weeds, and some plants which don't have any official status yet. All target species are either absent from Tasmania (as far as we know) or have a very limited distribution here.

Agricultural produce (hay, feed grain, seed for sowing, etc.) and livestock movement are important pathways for the spread of weeds. If you routinely feed out, are a cropping farmer, or new stock moves through your farm (this covers most primary producers!) then you could be an important Network member.

The Tasmanian Weed Alert Network's good progress to date is largely due to interest and guidance from the Network's government, community and primary production partners.

It's Coming... are you ready? Tasmanian Landcaring Grants from the bush to the beach

The project will be rolled out over the next two years. Grants (up to \$20,000) will be available for Care Groups and Key Partner Properties for projects that target the following Caring For our Country priorities:

- (i) Participation in natural resource management – building capacity and increasing the number of volunteers involved in nrm, and expanding the network of groups.
- (ii) Increasing native habitat – establishing or protecting native habitat including Ramsar wetlands and conducting strategic control of Weeds of National Significance (WONS).
- (iii) Increasing coastal community engagement – supporting coastal communities in projects that may include developing tracks and signage to protect cultural heritage and shorebird habitat, fencing and/or weed control projects.
- (iv) Improving knowledge and skills of land managers – improving knowledge and skills in nrm.

There will be three grant rounds over the life of the project, with rounds open for up to 12 weeks. TLCA is aiming to provide a

supportive application process for applicants, with two dedicated TLCA project staff (Alan Barton, Project Manager and Peter Stronach, Project Officer). TLCA is grateful for the support from various organisations, particularly the Parks & Wildlife Service.

With the support of Steering and Technical Assessment Committees, TLCA is currently developing assessment and eligibility criteria for grant applications, and finalising the process. The first round will open on March 27 and will close on May 11, 2010.

TLF Round 10 Projects

Congratulations to the two successful applicants in Round 10 of the Tasmanian Landcare Fund grants:

Warwick and Helen Morgan received \$3,040 to continue restoring riparian habitat on their property Glenford Farm, on the edge of Pipers River. Funding will contribute to restoring and maintaining wood structures, re-vegetation and follow up weed control. The local community, Lilydale Landcare group and Extra Hands volunteers will be invited to a field day and working bee as part of the project. Dates and details to be confirmed.

Brad and Ros Clark received \$7,100 to fence off a spring fed creek and wetland from livestock on their property at Meander. Blackberry and willows will be controlled and native re-vegetation completed. Extra Hands volunteers will be involved in some of the work.

Both landowners have recently joined the TLCA as Key Partner Properties (see *article page 5*).

TLF Round 11 Now Open

Round 11 of the Tasmanian Landcare Fund will be a general funding round in the north of the state (63 phone zone). All practical landcare projects that improve the management of Tasmania's water, soil, plants and animals will be considered. Applicants must be either a member care group, Extra Hands group, friend of the TLCA or Key Partner Property. Well considered, strategic projects that use best methods and address the Round 11 criteria may be funded up to \$15,000. Projects must also address community learning and participation.
